The Arboretum includes everything from the iconic saguaro to the bizarre Boojum, a spiky treelike succulent whose appearance has been likened to an upside-down carrot.

Featured Plant: Firecracker Bush

Common Name: firecracker bush Family Name: Acanthaceae

Botanical Name: Justicia spicigera

Justicia spicigera is native to NE Mexico and into the Southern tropical areas of Mexico. It is a broadleaf evergreen shrub that produces red-orange trumpet-shaped blooms from summer to winter. These nectar-filled blooms are adored by hummingbirds but also attract other bird and butterfly

species. Blooms are best in shady summer-locations and sunny winter location and the plant does well as a container plant or as a colorful counter-point to other desert shrubs growing in the landscape.
