Joseph Wood Krutch Garden Florilegium

The Campus Arboretum has established a Florilegium of the Joseph Wood Krutch Garden by working with the Sonoran Desert Florilegium Program to collect and create botanical art that documents the scientific and aesthetic value of the Krutch Garden native plant collection.

As part of the Campus Arboretum's 20th Anniversary Celebrations, the exhibit of the Florilegium aims to inspire visitors to pause, observe, consider, and study the plant kingdom they inhabit. In so doing, we aim to inspire further education and greater care for plants as they are essential to both our environmental and human health.

The exhibit will be on display August 9 through October 24, 2022 in the Bannister Building Lobby at 1215 E. Lowell Street. The gallery is open 8:00am to 5:00 pm Monday through Friday.

Featured Florilegium Plant: Echinocereus engelmannii


Botanical Name:

Echinocereus engelmannii

Common Name:

strawberry hedgehog cactus

Echinocereus engelmannii is a cactus which produces 20 to 30 stems, all approximately one foot high by three inches wide. Spines are flexible, two to three inches in length, and cover the green stem of the cactus. The color of the spines varies greatly from salt and pepper (black/white) to yellow, cream, and brown. The strawberry hedgehog is the earliest Sonoran native cactus to flower in spring. The blooms are show-stopping magenta in color!
